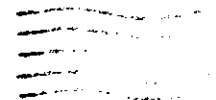

Upcoming Club Awards

It is now time for B-VARC members to submit their nominations of candidates for the club's annual awards, which are presented at the January banquet. These written nominations must be received by the club president no later than the December general membership meeting. The Brazos Valley Amateur Radio Club has three major awards.

I. *The Order of the Key*

The Order of the Key is unique to our club and is the highest honor that can be conferred by B-VARC. With this award, we recognize the B-VARC member who has made outstanding contributions to the progress of the club. These contributions might take the form of a long-term consistent commitment to service, or might represent an extremely high level of service for a shorter time. In any case, the award represents exceptional service and commitment to the goals of B-VARC.

Nominations for the Order of the Key may be made by an B-VARC member. The nominations must be made in writing to the club president, and should include a description of the nominee's contributions to the club. The President will then poll the Board of Directors secretly to allow them to vote on the nominations, and only he knows the results of the poll. The vote by the Board of Directors must be unanimous for the award to be conferred.

Written nominations must be received by the club president no later than December 11th

II. *The Dr. Bill Award*

In 1988, B-VARC initiated the presentation of the Dr. Bill Award, which was originated by Keith and Eva Huge (KA5F and KA5CYZ) in honor of Dr. Bill Ossenfort, NG5C, now a silent key, who was very active in the Volunteer Examiner Program in the Houston area. This award may be presented each year to the B-VARC member recognized as the outstanding participant in the B-VARC Volunteer Examiner Program.

In honor of Dr. Bill's memory, Keith and Eva Huge have prepared a beautiful plaque on which the

names of the award recipients are inscribed each year. The recipient holds the plaque during the year of presentation and passes it on to the next one who is honored. Each recipient also receives a smaller inscribed plaque as a permanent possession. This award is also unique to B-VARC.

Nominations for the Dr. Bill Award may be made by any member of the club, and must be submitted in writing to the President of B-VARC not later than the December regular membership meeting. The nomination should include a description of the nominee's contributions to the club's VE program. As with the other club awards, the Board of Directors selects the recipient(s).

III. *The Loop and Zepp Award*

In 1989, the Loop and Zepp Award was originated to recognize B-VARC members for their efforts to promote operation on the high frequency (HF) bands. These efforts may take the form of dedicated participation in any form or forms of HF activities, the promotion of HF activities or the assistance in furthering HF activities.

Nominations for the Loop and Zepp Award may be made by any member of the club, and should be submitted in writing to the president of the club no later than the December membership meeting. The nomination should include a description of the nominee's contributions to HF operation. As with the other club awards, the Board of Directors selects the recipient(s).

The M.E.R.A. Autopatch

Back in the sixties, a rock-and-roll group called "The Momma's and Pappa's" recorded the classic hit song *Monday Monday*. In it, they claimed you just "*can't trust that day*." October 28, 1991, was the Monday with my number on it.

"Every Other Day Of The Week Is Fine . . ."

My commute to work is about 22 miles. It is not a bad drive. In fact, most of my drive is spent north bound on the Sam Houston Tollway. Often, this provides a welcome opportunity to visit with fellow B-VARC members and friends on the M.E.R.A. (145.47) repeater.

"But Whenever Monday Comes . . ."

When M.E.R.A. voted by a very narrow margin to install an autopatch, many feared autopatch use could detract from the repeater's reputation as a friendly place where people come to visit. Fortunately for me and my Monday, the winning vote felt the autopatch would enhance M.E.R.A.'s ability to provide emergency communications without mutating the repeater into some unfriendly monster. After my Monday, I am glad we voted to go ahead with the autopatch. Here is why.

"You Can Find Me Cryin' . . ."

As I approached the I-10 interchange, the engine began making funny noises. A quick look at the tachometer showed the normal 2200 rpm's temporarily jumping as high as 8,000 rpm's (tach limit). I know very little about auto mechanics, but I knew I was in trouble.

Immediately, I reached for my microphone. At the first opportunity, I keyed up, announcing "BREAK" (this was not a threat to life, health or property so I did not use "BREAK BREAK").

Hearing "Go ahead breaker", I stated that I needed use the patch now. Even though this was prime commuting time and I had not declared an emergency, the friendly voice came back saying "go ahead."

I identified myself and punched in the speed dial code for my house. I knew my XYL (N5LGS) was home. Maybe she knew something about auto mechanics.

When Karla (my XYL) answered, I said "Monitor 5.47, I am having engine trouble and may need you to pick me up." If she responded, I missed it.

I dropped the patch; the engine dropped me. As I shifted into neutral and began coasting to a stop, I heard Karla check in on the repeater. I told her where I was and what I needed. She took care of everything else. While waiting on the wrecker, I used my amateur radio to visit with friends and ruminate on the cause of my dilemma.

"All Of The Time . . ."

Ok, so this wasn't the story of how amateur radio saved a life or stopped some evil criminal act. In fact, this was not even a story of how having the autopatch made a big difference in getting help when things went sour (after all, there were plenty of hams on the air to lend a hand).

So what's the point? Having the patch is, as predicted, an enhancement to the services the M.E.R.A. repeater offers its users. Amateurs using the repeater have kept it just as friendly and helpful as it has always been. And, most importantly, what if my problem had happened late at night or some other time when no amateurs were monitoring?

Note: M.E.R.A. (Memorial Emergency Radio Association) makes all emergency speed dial codes available to all amateur radio operators. However, patch access for other use is restricted to users to whom a "free subscription" has been granted. To get a list of the emergency speed dial codes or an application for a "free subscription," contact Gerry Borg (N5APW), the repeater trustee at 771-2969.
