Antenna Antics

For many moons it stood alone, tall and proud. Maybe it dreamed of the glory days before its owner abandoned CB (citizen's band).

Yes, those were the days. But those days were over. Now, the neglected antenna, still as good as it ever was, fell victim to that last barter before the junkyard... a garage sale.

Here, the Bargain Hunter struck. Proudly, he placed the antenna in his trophy room (a junk closet).

Still, the little antenna hoped for a rainbow. Even though 11-meters was no longer in vogue, many of its peers had been given a second chance. Strange beings, called "Hams", revived them for use on the 10-meter band.

But what about the 2-meter band? Gerry Borg, N5APW, wanted to build a magnetic-mount mobile antenna for Suzanne King, KB5BAY. The little antenna's hope united with Ham ingenuity.

Out from the closet came the long neglected base-load CB antenna. Some minutes of fidgeting and furning revealed the secrets of disassembly, leaving parts scattered about the room.

Defeating the load coil was fairly simple. Gerry estimated the initial length of the whip to be 20 inches, better to start a lot long than a little short.

Mike Kana, KA5WOT, joined the effort. He explained that SWR measurements must be made with a meter designed for the frequencies being transmitted.

Jack Van Demark, WN5A, loaned Gerry an SWR meter for the 2-meter band. Step by step, in small fractions of an inch, the original estimate of 20 inches was slowly trimmed to a little over 12 inches.

The efforts produced a very inexpensive magnetic-mount mobile antenna with an SWR less than 1.2 to 1 across the 2-meter band.

Once again, the little antenna rides high. This time atop Suzanne's car.


ABOUT THE BRAZOS VALLEY AMATEUR RADIO CLUB

Dear Special Service Club:

A public relations firm in New York City that works for League HQ got several articles about the "ARRL's Program for the Disabled" published in the May 1987 issues of Paraplegia News, Sports 'N Spokes, and DAV. These articles have generated over 250 responses from physically disabled people who want more information on ham radio. The problem, however, is that League HQ doesn't have the resources to adequately meet the special needs these people present. I contacted Maureen Pranghofer, KFØI, Student Coordinator, Courage Handi-Ham System, Minneapolis, MN, to find out how League HQ could steer these prospective physically disabled hams to people who could provide the needed help.

Maureen said that the Handi-Ham System has no structured program for teaching physically disabled prospective hams. Most of the teaching is accomplished on a one-to-one basis. Maureen is interested in getting a pool of volunteer instructors willing to learn how to help the physically disabled prospective ham. The Courage Handi-Ham System will provide the volunteer instructor/ham club with adaptive devices. The volunteer instructor can contact the Handi-Ham System by phone or letter for personal advice on problems that might come up. Maureen stressed that she'd like the volunteer instructors to become members of the Handi-Ham System. She added not many people are aware that membership in Handi-Hams is open to all hams--whether or not the ham is physically disabled.

The ARRL Club Services Department currently sends a prospective ham packet to all physically disabled people who write or call us for more information. We don't include a computer printout of instructors and clubs in the inquirer's area, however, since we don't want to refer a physically disabled prospective ham to a specific club or instructor unless that club or instructor has indicated an interest in this kind of outreach.
