

All written communications to B-VARC must be sent to our P.O. Box. All mail sent to the box goes to our treasurer. The treasurer is Frank D'Armas (KB5EQG).

Frank routes the mail to the appropriate B-VARC committee chairman or board member.

This method may seem a little slower, but it is reliable.

Captain Warms was overwhelmed by what was happening and failed to recognize the distress signal should have been sent with the first notice of "stand by boats." There was so much confusion on the bridge Warms could not respond to every demand.

By 3:10 AM all electric wiring had burned though and the ship was in darkness. They lost the gyrocompass, the electric steering apparatus and the standby hydraulic system. There was no telephone communication. With no rudder steering was done by the engines.

At 3:15 AM the silent period found no order to send the distress signal. The silent period for safety at sea of passengers grew out of the "worlds safest ship" Titanic disaster when when the radio operators refused to stop sending commercial messages and failed to receive the warning the ship was headed into a dangerous field of icebergs.

The emergency was so great both Rogers and Alagna agreed they must do something. As soon as the silent period was reached, Rogers did what he thought was necessary to alert the shore stations.

Let's look at the official log of WIM, 250 miles north of Cape Cod.

"3:15 AM EST Silent period.
3:16 AM EST KGOV CQ WSG (Tuckerton)
KGOV QRX 3 mins KGOV seconds later calls CQ no
QRZ may have emergency call."

Rogers had sent "CQ KGOV." KGOV is the call letters of the MORRO CASTLE. Tuckerton had replied to remain silent for three minutes. During the silent period, short of the actual distress signal, the shore stations demand absolute silence and all stations be on listening status.

Again, Alagna is on his way forward; surrounded now by discolored glowing bulkheads.

For the first time Captain Warms talked directly to Alagna and orders the SOS sent at 3:18 AM. The exact position is obtained, but it would be several minutes before Alagna can fight his way through the smoke and flames to reach the radio room.

Before Alagna can find the radio room the engins stop. There is one long blast of the whistle for "abandon ship." The anchor is dropped.

In the radio room the smoke is so thick a flashlight has to be held six inches from the transmitter key to see where it is. Rogers is not fully aware of his situation. He feels intense heat through the deck and his feet are blistered. Smoke and flames are coming in through the open port holes.

Rogers is nearly unconscious when he tapped out the SOS. Before he could finish the batteries disintegrate in a violent explosion throwing metal and acid in every direction. The emergency generator starts again. Rogers manageed to tap out the location. A final explosion of the outside gasoline tank and the transmitter dies.

Boiling battery acid covered the floor, blinding smoke and fumes filled the radio room but somehow Alagna helped half drag Rogers out into the corridor. These radio operators stayed at their posts until every item of equipment was useless, and by what could only be termed a miracle were still alive. They were still far some safe. Moving on their now blistered feet was painful.

SOS de MORRO CASTLE (3rd of 5)

Smoke and heat was building rapidly in the radio room. Operator Maki was told to get some towels, wet them and they could put them over their heads and breathe through the towels.

By this time Alagna had to fight his way through heavy yellow acid smoke and flames to the radio room. No one on the bridge would give the order to send a distress signal. Warms at this point was ceratin the fire could be contained even though the Derby fire panal had completely lit. Warms was not aware the ships fire fighting system had beed designed for only a few units to be needed at one time. Now every hydrant that could be used to fight this out of control fire was needed, and the pressure was not available for every station. Some of the hydrants were out of order or capped so tightly they could not be opened. Some had even been sealed.

At about 3 AM Maki was checking the battery connections to the emergency transmitter when the Lyle guns' (designed to fire a breeches buoy to another shop for passenger evacuation) one-hundred pounds of gun powder exploded. The fire now spread further through shattered windows.

Alagna was on his way to the bridge; this time wearing his Radio Officer's cap so he could be better recognized. The passageway was a wall of fire so time was lost going down and then coming back through the inside bridge ladder.

Fortunately, B-VARC has provisions for such occasions. We call it the ORDER OF THE KEY. Congratulations George!

Congratulations Joe Ross (AA5BD). In 1987, Joe spent 36 weeks teaching three novice/technician classes for B-VARC. A group of amatuers (former students) gave Joe an award for being such an outstanding ELMER.
