The S.H.O.T. chapter continues to wait for the results of the 1993 Winter QSO Party. As soon as the results are announced by the Colorado Bighorn chapter, the current SSB QSO Party scoring chapter, we will pass them along to you. Meanwhile, the 1993 Spring CW QSO Party was held May 1-2, 1993. W5RAN, Harry Hatcher, a S.H.O.T. member from Friendswood, TX, reports making ninety contacts for one hundred and twenty points. With a score like that, Harry may take first place in the CW QSO Party!

New participants in the S.H.O.T. nets include Lanny, KB5VTB, Mike, KB5TOJ, and Mike KB5YVT. It's wonderful to see more operators become active on ten meters. The S.H.O.T. chapter extends a warm welcome, and we look forward to having others join us in future nets.

Ten Ten paper chaser activity continues on 28.345 mhz, but the frequency is less active than it was a few months ago. Ten Ten chapters with specials for

paper chasers this month include Battle Road (MA), Branding Iron (TX), Steel City (IL) and Borinage (Belgium). Two longtime chapters are making a comeback. Broken Heart (AL) and Electric City (FL) are re-organizing and will soon be active again. Finally, some sad news for paper chasers was announced at the Ten Ten banquet at the Dayton Hamvention. Don Knauff, KA1BFC, became a silent key last month while working in Indonesia. Don, who recently gave many Ten Ten members their first Indonesian contact, was from Connecticut. I remember working him when he was ZS6ATX in South Africa. KA5BFC will be missed by many Ten Ten members.

Summer propagation is now firmly entrenched on ten meters. I still operate mobile from the roof of my downtown parking garage several days a week during my lunch period. Recent contacts for me include KB7SFL in Wyoming, 5NOMRD/6W1 in Senegal, and LU4MEE in Argentina. T.J., KB5TIB, reports that ten meters has been open for a few hours in the mid to late afternoon during recent weeks, and he has worked the west coast. B-VARC Board of Directors Meeting Minutes, May 6, 1993

A quorum of the B-VARC Board of Directors met at the Sugar Land Community Center on May 6, 1993. This was the fifth meeting of the Board of Directors for the 1993 calendar year.

The minutes of the April 1st meeting were submitted by Bud King, N5UOG, and approved unanimously.

The Club Treasurer, Sam Wilson, N5CPA, reported a balance of \$3860.51 in the treasury as of April 30, 1993. The Treasurer's report was approved unanimously.

President Betty Wilcox, KAØTEN, welcomed the 7 Board Members, 3 Committee Chairmen, and 4 visiting club members to the meeting at 7:30 p.m. She further mentioned that since all Board meetings were open meetings, it would be desirable if more members would attend the Board meetings and give the Board the benefit of their thinking on the various club projects being discussed.

Vice-President Doug Holley, KE5SR, reported that he had been able to secure a new reservation date for the B-VARC "Camp out", that was rained out on May 1st. The new date will be July 17, at the same site. Doug stated that he was surprised and pleased by the gracious cooperation of the Park Service personnel in letting him reschedule the date of the event.

Claudi Kozinetz, N5VCZ, reported that the ALA Clean Air Bike Ride scheduled for May 2nd had been rained out. Unfortunately it was impossible for the ALA to set a new date for the event. Claudia stated further that it was gratifying to see that all communication volunteers were present, in spite of the rain. In answer to questions posed by Claudia concerning

the B-VARC members' reactions to working the MS-150 Bike Ride, all members present who participated in the event agreed that it was a rewarding experience — an event worthy of rescheduling.

The Board missed the report on the B-VARC Rag Chew Net usually presented by Mel Thatcher, KB5ION, due to Mel's absence; however, Sam Wilson, N5CPA, indicated they were receiving from twelve to fifteen check-in's at every session.

Al Zermeno, KK5W, noted that he had received from the ARRL Headquarters a package containing the "Point Systems for Field Day". As Chairman of the 1993 B-VARC Field Day Committee, Al is requesting that club members respond to the call for volunteers to staff the various functions that make up a complete and successful Field Day. The regular B-VARC meeting on June 10, 1993, will have as it's program a combination of "ELF Electro-Magnetic Radiation" and "Field Day Information".

Vincent Orlando, WA5ETS, reported that the club membership has reached 228 members. Vincent agreed to print extra copies of the B-VARC *Bulletin* for distribution to various retail outlets in the Houston area.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

ELF Electromagnetic Radiation and the Risk of Cancer

Are 60 hz. power lines hazardous to your health? How about cellular telephones? Contrary to statements made by some officials, there is an extraordinary amount of data in the scientific literature which suggests reason for concern. A comprehensive review of this data clearly points up one fact; surprisingly little is understood about the mechanism of interaction of these radiations with living organisms including man.

Most scientists have generally ignored people like Charlotte King. Predictions such as those made by King are not taken seriously by the scientific community. Because of the relationship between active faulting and longwave propagation that Project Beacon is documenting, some of King's claims may have merit. She may be sensing some of the same ELF and VLF phenomena that other workers are documenting with sophisticated electronic receiving equipment. At any rate, a number of people are now evaluating Charlotte King's ability to sense low frequency signals, and this ability is becoming known as "Charlotte's Syndrome."

The Amazing Charlotte King by Al Mattis, N5AFV

One of the results of Project Beacon that caught me by surprise was the number of letters and telephone calls that I have received from other researchers and workers. My biggest surprise since I started this project came on April 24, 1993, when I received a telephone call from Charlotte King. Some of you have probably read about Charlotte King; she has been the subject of a number of reports that have appeared in the national news media.

King, who lives in Salem, Oregon, began to hear odd sounds in 1976. More correctly, she began to feel or sense these sounds, which included something similar to Morse code. Gradually, she became more sensitive to these sounds and subsequent testing at the National Bureau of Standards in Boulder, Colorado, indicated that King was responding to extremely low frequency (ELF) and very low frequency (VLF) radio signals. As her sensitivity increased, King began to exhibit physical and emotional symptoms that were apparently related to her ability to sense these radio signals.

As a result of her ability to sense these low frequencies, Charlotte King believes that she is now able to predict earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. She describes herself as a "sensitive," and she claims an eighty percent accuracy rate for recent predictions. King claims that various geographical areas produce different "signatures" for her, such as variations in sensed tones, nausea, and headaches. In our telephone conversation, King told me that she was able to sense the April 9, 1993, earthquake here in Texas. Other areas where she claims success at predicting earthquakes include California, the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, and Chile.

Dayton Hamvention 1993

Dayton Hamvention 1993 was the largest convention and swapfest in the United States. Few words that I can write will describe the sheer mass of this convention.

The flea market opened Thursday, April 22, to only the flea market vendors. No selling or swapping was to be allowed, only the setup of tables or tents — but nothing could be further from the truth. When we pulled up with our Suburban and trailer, several hundred people followed us until we stopped at our assigned spaces.

We were helped with unloading and setup; then the serious trading began. Within two hours, half of what we came with was history. By the next few hours, we bought or traded most of our equipment.

The flea market officially opened to the public on Friday, April 23, at 8:00 a.m., and the inside vendors of new equipment opened at noon that same day. The crowds came in by the thousands to buy, sell, or trade. The immensity of the crowd of people is hard to describe. After the vendors opened, some of the crowd that was outside converged inside to escape the flea market crowds and to look at or buy new equipment.

Money was flowing briskly inside. Most vendors' equipment began disappearing at a quick pace. Each day and night the vendors were re-stocked. By Sunday, April 25, most flea market items were gone, and inside sales were slow because the merchandise was depleted.

The weather was good throughout the convention. A hot wind blew most of the time. We were wind burned, but the temperatures were within limits. On Sunday a slow rain started, but vendors and traders had little left to sell anyway. During the 1992 convention, we experienced heat and a lot of rain mixed with sleet.

The attendance at the convention was just shy of 40,000. Most items that were brought to sell were sold. We, in our group from Texas, sold everything. The flea market spaces numbered over five thousand, and all were used. Many inside vendors were not counted. A few fleamarket spaces were used to park vehicles, but towing was enforced.

I thought the convention was great; some hams, however, did experience problems. Lack of hotel rooms and malfunctioning reservation computers left some hams upset. Parking at the convention site was almost non-existent; the few parking sites that were available were controlled by scalpers. Most hotels did offer transportation to and from the convention with shuttle buses; but this proved cumbersome when transporting ham equipment. Areas for parking need to be constructed for the general public.

The dayton Hamvention is truly the biggest and best hamvention ever. Participants came from every state and many foreign countries. If you ever have the opportunity to attend the Dayton Hamvention, you will not be disappointed.
