August was a busy month for the SHOT Certificate Manager. The Houston SHOT chapter is pleased to welcome the following new local members to the chapter: Van Rathgeber, KC5JRM; Wil Cannonier, KK5JJ; Marcia Cannonier, N5NND; Don Rhode, KM5ID; and Chip Ewing, KD5ATA. During the past month, the chapter was also pleased to welcome KB0YFN, N1WCZ, KA4RVZ, KB8OKK, N1YKL, KI8AP and KC5QBG as non-local members. The increase in propagation, as well as the August QSO Party, have caused this increase in applications for SHOT membership and upgrades.

Remember that 28.170 MHz is used by many Ten Ten members as a CW calling frequency. The frequency of 28.335 MHz is used by many Ten Ten members while mobile.

Paper chasers continue to be active on 28.345 MHz and 28.375 MHz during band openings. The occurrence of summer E-layer propagation has brought more activity to the band. The Branding Iron (TX), Steel City (IL), Peach State (TX), Route 66 (IN), Twin Cities (MN) and Pirates of the Mississippi (IL) chapters have

announced specials for paper chasers to promote activity when the band is open. Ten Ten members were happy to hear that Ray Dobson, N5DAS, of San Antonio, has been released from the hospital following treatment for a cardiac problem. Dobson is the chapter head and certificate manager of the South Texas Light Horse Brigade chapter of Ten International.

Ten meter propagation continued to show improvement during the past month. Summer E-layer propagation was particularly good in early August. A number of openings between Europe and the eastern United States were reported, and frequent Latin American contacts were reported by Houston stations. Even though the current low of the solar cycle continues to linger on, there are signs that propagation is improving.

Remember, the Houston SHOT (Space Houston On Ten) net meets every Tuesday evening at 8 PM local time on 28.488 MHz. All amateurs are welcome to check in, even if they do not have a Ten Ten number. If you are not a member of Ten Ten International and wish to join the organization, please check in to the net. There are a lot of exciting activities in Ten Ten, and many friendly people can be found on the ten meter band.

# V<u>OLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR</u> M<u>ARATHON WARM-UP SERIES 25K</u> R<u>ACE</u>

This year's 25K Marathon Warm-Up Series Race will be held on sunday, November 16, 1997, and volunteers are needed to provide communications for the event. Providing communications at a public service event is a lot of fun, and it helps provide a positive image of amateur radio in the community.

For the sixth consecutive year, the 25K race will be run along Memorial Drive, with the start and finish lines being located in downtown Houston. Amateur radio communications has played an important role in previous years. Houston area race directors still talk about the year that a hot air balloon landed on the 25K course, just as the race was about to start. The course was blocked. and amateur radio operators were able to notify the race director and delay the start of the race until the balloon was cleared. Amateur radio also played a key role in past years in passing medical traffic. The race covers a distance of 25 kilometers (15.5 miles) and is a serious athletic event rather than a "fun run." In seven of the last ten years, injured runners from the 25K race have been taken to the hospital by ambulance.

Because the race starts at 7 am, communications volunteers need to arrive by 6 am. The race lasts several hours, and all communications volunteers were released by 10:45 am last year.

Acclaimed ham radio icon Milton F. "Doug" DeMaw, W1FB, died September 28. He was 71. One of the most widely published technical writers in Amateur Radio, DeMaw was diagnosed with leukemia earlier this year and had been in failing health in recent weeks.

DeMaw was first licensed in 1950 as W8HHS. An electrical engineer, he was a member of the ARRL Headquarters staff for 18 years--from

1965 to 1983--and served as Technical Department Manager and Senior Technical Editor from 1970 to 1983. During his tenure at HQ, DeMaw served as editor of The ARRL Handbook. In 1970, he engineered the shift in emphasis toward solid-state design in QST and

the Handbook

He has hundreds of articles in QST and other publications to his credit. DeMaw also was founder and publisher of VHFer Magazine. (His Wife, Jean, W1CKK, also worked on the Headquarters staff.) DeMaw was a life member of the ARRL and a senior member of the IEEE.

After retiring to the family farm in Luther, Michigan, he was elected chairman of the Lake County Board of Commissioners and continued to write books and articles. He also tried his hand in the Amateur Radio business as proprietor of Oak Hills Research. Among his other books, DeMaw wrote W1FB's Design Notebook, W1FB's QRP Notebook, W1FB's Antenna Notebook, and The ARRL Electronics Data Book, which remain popular. In recent years, DeMaw also penned a regular column for CQ magazine.

A former ARRL colleague, Membership Services Manager Chuck Hutchinson, K8CH, counted DeMaw among his friends. "Doug loved to experiment with circuits and antennas. He also loved to encourage others to try their hand at building," he recalled. Hutchinson said DeMaw not only wrote prolifically about ham radio but also about gardening, another of his avocations. "He was an avid gardener and cook," he said. DeMaw also was an outdoorsman and hunter. "He loved to hunt with bow and rifle--both modern and muzzle loader. He was very good at throwing a knife or hatchet," Hutchinson said. Paul Pagel, N1FB, also was one of DeMaw's colleagues during his days at ARRL HQ. "Amateur Radio benefited greatly from his work," Pagel said. "He was a multifaceted man. I doubt there was anything he couldn't do if he set his mind to it." Jerry Hall, K1TD, who also worked with DeMaw during his years at HQ, called DeMaw a writer of "uncanny" ability. "Doug could write it once, and it was done," he recalled.

Survivors include DeMaw's wife, Jean, and a son, David, N8HLE, a technical writer who lives in Connecticut.


