SOUTH TEXAS BALLOON LAUNCH – BLT 27

On December 8, 1990, the soon-to-be-called South Texas Balloon Launch Team (BLT) launched their first amateur-radio balloon from the Huntsville Municipal Airport. The payload was a simple, handcrafted affair including a custom two-meter-FM transmitter and a telemetry system for temperature data sent as audio tones. Estimates showed that the balloon may have risen to over 100,000 feet until burst. It took over 28 hours to locate the package high in a tree in a private game preserve near Tomball. It was a grand experiment and has inspired many flights since.

BLT-27 The Flight of the TOYZ

Nearly 21 years after the flight of BALLOON-1, we flew BLT-27 on August 20, 2011. We had five autonomous payloads full of curiosities, thus the name Flight of the TOYZ. Subassemblies from previous flights were distributed in the payload string, and new experiments were created specifically for the event. We have learned a lot over the previous two decades, but there are always issues associated with sending things into the hostile environment at the Edge of Space. The final results though were excellent, and everyone involved did a fantastic job to make the flight TOYZ happen.

The complete list of payloads can be seen at <http://www.w5acm/b27.html>. The list of things that worked and support organizations and individuals that made it all happen is quite long. Planning for a launch begins several months in advance. The BLT group identifies projects worthy of pursuit. New devices are either purchased or developed for the flight. Consumables like batteries, balloons and helium are located and purchased with money from donations and the sale of T-shirts and DVDs. Flight gear is tested, packaged and then retested. A launch facility is secured and coordination with the FAA is established. All of this happens long before the launch. A few days before the target flight date, weather and flight ground-track predictions are initiated.

For BLT-27 we were once again invited to Hanger 31 at the Wharton Municipal Airport by SkyTrails CEO Fredrick Scheffel. It is the perfect venue for our balloon launch campaign on the south side of what we call the Wharton Intergalactic Spaceport. The name was inspired by an article in the July 27, 1994, Wharton Journal Spectator about a BLT launch. The title was "Wharton's Own Space Probe".

A key donation for BLT-27 came from BVARC. It paid for all of our flight batteries and helium, and was GREATLY appreciated. Many of the BLT crew are members of BVARC, and now many BVARC members are participants in the BLT. The BLT re-mailer sign-up page is <http://lists.stevens.com/mailman/listinfo>.

Our FAA contact from a number of previous flights, Mike W5MAB did not have time this year to take on the task of coordinating with the government folks. Chris WB5ITT stepped up at the 11th hour and handled the job like a pro. Our seasoned balloon handler John WA5WOD was informed that he would be attending a wedding in Palestine Texas on flight day, so Darrell KC5JAR learned that job without fanfare when he was finished working with Charlie K5ENG gassing up the balloon. It didn't phase Darrell that this was the largest group of individual payloads ever attempted by the BLT on a single balloon.

The two-meter to 70-cm FM cross-band link is always a hit. There was some interference issues at times during the flight, but the QSO count and coverage was stellar. This year we also had a two-meter FM to six-meter AM "remote-controlled station". It acted like a cross-band repeater and was a vast improvement over the two-meter FM to ten-meter DSB unit used for the prior two flights. The new six-meter AM transmitter only has two active components - an oscillator IC and a power transistor, but produces high-quality AM with 400 mW output. It will be flown again.

A true curiosity for BLT-27 was the solar-powered ten-meter CW beacon with over 400 mW output. It sent temperature and power output telemetry for the duration of the flight and was heard as far away as Georgia. Another delight was the 70-cm parrot repeater package that also sent voice GPS telemetry and Martin-2 format SSTV images from the down-looking integral camera. The parrot repeater would listen for 36 seconds, send what was heard, speak the telemetry and transmit the picture. In its spare time prior to a memory fault, it also recorded video files from the camera. Thomas KT5TK turned this Android phone into an incredible ham TOY connected to a mini 70-cm transceiver.

Four payloads had some form of GPS system. Two were operational for the whole flight. The still camera by Pete KD5ELH on the main payload took over 1300 high-resolution photos, over 400 of which were fabulous flight shots

from launch to landing. The live video system had problems but the on-board HD recorder from Tom K5SAF got over four hours of fantastic video and even recorded conversations on the way back to Hinze's BBQ from the "crash" site. The High-Speed-Multi-Media MESH team with AG5RS, K5SAF, KK2Z and KT5TK made significant strides with flight gear and ground equipment, but have more experiments to get this art reclassified as a science.

BLT-27 cooperated with its landing site this year, i.e. it stayed away from freeways, big trees, lakes and rivers. The chase team with folks like NU5K, KF5GWX, AD5SS, W2CVZ, N5PTN, N5MT and AB5SS make the chore of finding the balloon and payloads look easy and fun. We didn't have enough helium for a second balloon to fly the 900-MHz ATV, RC plane by N5RPQ, W5BSA and WA5F, but they had some great hand-launched flights from the SkyTrails hanger. The audio beeper worked fine, once we were reminded to turn it on... To The Edge of Space!

Rick Hiller called the monthly Board of Directors meeting for the Brazos Valley Amateur Radio Club to order at 7:12 PM on July 7th, 2011 at Fudrucker's, 11445 Fountain Lake Drive, Stafford, TX. Attending were: Rick Hiller, W5RH (Pres.); Kirk Kendrick, KK2Z (V.Pres); Bill Stone, WS5H (1yr At-Large Dir.); Dwayne Jones, KB5YTA (2 yr At-Large Dir.); Ross Lawler, W5HFF (2 Yr. At-Large Dir.); Eddie Runner, NU5K (Webmaster); Cameron Mitchell, K5CAM; Suzanne Runner, KF5GWZ; Norma Stone, KE5NDN; Charles Frost, K5LBU; David Barber, K5NDB; David Beers, AF5T; John Chauvin, K5IZO; Angel Abbott-Jones, KC5KRV; Billy Jones, N5EVD.

- 1) Minutes for the June 2011 meeting were approved as previously distributed by email and appears in the August 2011 newsletter.
- 2) Treasurer's Report was presented to and approved by the Board. Comments on the Field Day expenses and questioned any unreported expenses. Some gas receipts still not submitted. Chauvin commented that we could project a deficit in the operating costs this year.
- 3) V.P Meeting Agenda Report – Kendrick reported that the Ice Cream Social for August will be held at the S.L. community Center. Ross, W5HFF, volunteered again and Rick Hiller also stepped up as a co-chair for this year. September and October meetings have E-QSL scheduled with alternatives of Fox Hunt/Direction Finding and HF Radio operation. November is Chili supper and December is Homebrew.

BVARC Historical Vignettes – The BVARC Public Service Net

One of the very first things BVARC did after it was founded in 1977 was to start a Monday evening Emergency Net on two meters. This net was the forerunner of today's BVARC Public Service Net. Back in the 1970s the use of the two meter band and FM repeaters was not as widespread as it is today and many amateur radio operators only had HF equipment. Nonetheless, BVARC's first net was established on two meters because use of that band was in keeping with the club's desire to focus on emergency preparedness and communications.

Over the years the BVARC Public Service Net has been held on many different repeaters, but it has always been held on Monday evening. The net currently meets at 8 pm local time on the 146.94 (167.9) repeater. The Public Service Net has always used a rotating schedule of net control operators. The hectic pace of check-ins during the initial portion of the net sometimes provides a challenge for the net control station, and our club owes a great deal to the net control stations who work very hard to keep our nets on the air.

BVARC newsletter editor Jackie Burton (now Jackie Moody) KC5OHJ instituted publication of the number of check-ins to the Public Service Net in the club newsletter in January 1996. Using the information from the newsletters I was able to assemble a database consisting of data from 705 sessions of the Public Service Net. The total number of check-ins for these nets was 18,337. The average number of check-ins for a session of the Public Service Net has been 26. The lowest number of check-ins for the Public Service Net was eight on both December 31, 2001 when Cameron Mitchell K5CAM called the net, and on May 16, 2005 when Joe Morgan K5JWM called the net. The highest number of check-ins for a session of the Public Service Net occurred March 4, 1996 when a total of 68 stations checked into the net; club records do not give the identity of the net control station for that net. It is quite possible that a higher number of check-ins to the Public Service Net occurred during the period 1990-1994 when club membership peaked at 270.

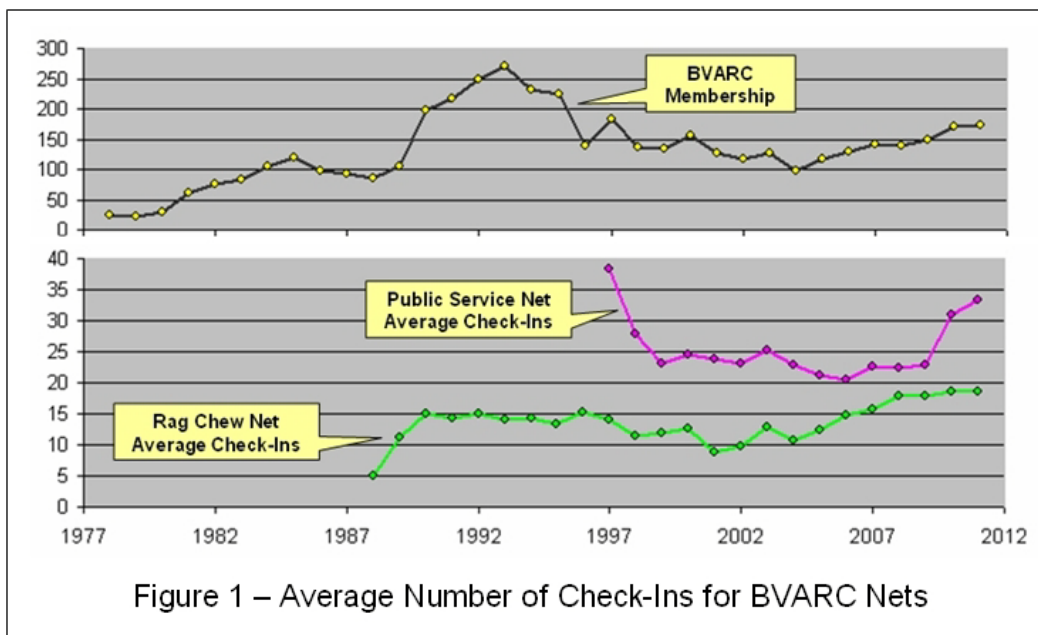


Figure 1 – Average Number of Check-Ins for BVARC Nets

Figure 1 compares the average number of check-ins for the Rag Chew and Public Service Nets with the number of members in BVARC. Next month we will take an historical look at the BVARC Rag chew Net.
