

# CQ, Panama Canal – by K5HM

With the bands alive in Cycle 25 this year, so is the contest activity. Hey! That rhymes! A lot of individuals and clubs are getting on the air. They may lack contest experience, but their enthusiasm makes up for it.

There are a variety of groups vying for your attention out there. In addition to the worldwide contests, there are many local clubs getting active with Parks on the Air or Summits on the Air. But have you tried the more esoteric of them? WOTA (Walmarts on the Air) or PHOTA (Pancake House on the Air)? That is a lively crowd.



If you are King, like King Mswati III, you can even rename your country to create a new DX entity in Africa. King Mswati III recently renamed the former Swaziland as Eswatini, giving it a very Internet like name. He nearly bankrupted the country because he also needed to create new currency, and postage stamps. What? Is he kidding? Is that some kind of special event station? No, but it is good to be king.

There are plenty of events like the Battle of Carabobo International Contest; the Amplitude Modulation QSO Party or the COVID-19 Contest.

You might hear some strange QSO's on the air this year as hams work to earn the DXCC Diamond Challenge, commemorating the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the DXCC award. To earn the award, you must contact 100 or more of the countries that were on the first DXCC list 75 years ago.

Many countries that existed in 1937 no longer exist. That created some interesting challenges when pursuing this award. The ARRL has a list of current entities to represent former countries from 1937 on their website. Work Ethiopia to get credit for Abyssinia. For the former Belgian Congo, you can work Democratic Republic of the Congo (9Q), Burundi (9U) or Rwanda (9X). How easy is that! The city of Kaliningrad (RF2), which is its own DXCC entity today but politically part of Russia, gives you credit for 1937 Germany, when it was known as Konigsberg. There are some oddities in the list.

My personal favorite was the Canal Zone (formerly KZ5), which of course is now part of Panama. To qualify for the Canal Zone credit, you had to work a Panamanian (HP) station that is within 8 kilometers of the canal.

How would that work? You might try, "CQ, CQ, Panama Canal within 8 KM" Or "CQ HP <= 8KM de the Canal" Try that on CW or RTTY!

ME: Cool, Good enough for me. Got you in the log. Thanks Ralf. 73



# The Radio Holel FT8 - A Change of Attitude

I grew up in last century's Amateur Radio world with CW and SSB being my friends. No AM or RTTY for me. Rag chew QSO's were the mainstay of operation and DX country count chasing mostly being done with "5 9 Texas" type exchanges. When the new digital modes came along I found them to be more like RTTY. Legit, but still not my cup of tea. Then came the JT modes being utilized for EME work and for EME that made perfect sense, but I still didn't partake. When JT moved to FT and into the normal HF modes of short QSO's for DX'ing and contesting I found it totally uninteresting. Working stations you can't hear? No thanks. My ears and brain were my information demodulators and I liked it that way.

But then, just recently, along comes Gerald Youngblood, K5SDR, the founder, CEO and top notch SDR guru from Flex Radio in Austin writing an opinion piece that I just happened to stumble across. As he, I too had received my novice license over 50 years ago and met the technical challenges with excitement and wonder. But I stayed the on-air course of CW and SSB that I had set, varying little, only diving deep into the world of antenna systems that supported my on-air ops. Gerald, on the other hand, went with the flow toward leading edge technology.

He references a book about "The Tipping Point" – a critical point in time and technological development beyond which a significant and often unstoppable effect or change takes place. As he puts it, "The tipping point is that magic moment when an idea, trend, or social behavior crosses a threshold, tips, and spreads like wildfire." He sees the phenomena of FT 8 being just that tipping point and questions whether it is positive or negative. Some think FT modes will kill amateur radio and others believe that such innovations give the hobby new life. He discusses the opinion of many that FT modes will be the end to Amateur Radio. I personally didn't see that FT8 based demise, but I still had no interest. He points out that FT8 is a weak signal application, not a low power application and highlights a few benefits of the mode. Such as:

- FT8 counters the recently current dearth of sunspots
- FT8 opens "dead bands"
- FT8 lets little pistols work DXCC like a big gun
- FT8 lets you work the world from small or deed restricted lots
- FT8 lets you work weak signal DX without proficient CW skills
- FT8 lets you work DXCC on 160m without a big station
- FT8 is amazing and literally space age technology

Yes, FT8 is mostly automated and it reduces the skill required to make DX contacts. It also removes conversation and the human factor from the QSO, but that is true of the majority of DX chasing in any mode. Now here is where he gets to the core of the matter and pulls at my heart strings. He states, that it is his opinion that FT8 is at the very heart of what amateur radio has been about from its inception – *amateurs who love the art of radio enhancing the art of radio.* The FCC in Part 97.1 lists the five tenets that define amateur radio, the second one being: "Continuation and extension of the amateur's proven ability to contribute to the advancement of the radio art." I had forgotten this part of the definition, as to what makes my favorite hobby possible. FT8, as I now see it, is an example of what will keep it alive and relevant. What will kill amateur radio is if we cease to innovate, become old and grumpy, and no longer bring new blood into the hobby. Unfortunately, I have for some time now resembled that remark. But with a new onus, I now intend to change.

A new year is right around the corner and is prime for me to venture into the wonderful world of DX'ing behind a computer. A lot to learn, but as Gerald says, "FT modes are great all of the time and there will be times of phone and CW QSOs when the numbers are right". In my mind now, these are the best of both worlds. For me, a 'not too late' necessary change in attitude. I hope one for you too. FT8? Indeed, as I explore my sixth decade of interest in shortwave radio. Thanks, Gerald.

# The Z6 Mystery – by K5HM

Ah, the good old days when men were men and call signs were whatever you wanted. That is apparently what happened in Kosovo.

This tiny country recently declared itself independent from Serbia in 2008 for reasons we are all probably are aware. Without waiting for full diplomatic recognition, the government of Kosovo assigned itself the Z6 prefix and has issued several amateur radio licenses. Kosovo won its battle to become a DXCC entity in 2018. But the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) has



determined that the Z6 call sign prefix was never allocated to Kosovo. The Secretary-General issued his finding in the wake of a March 16 inquiry from Serbia, from which Kosovo declared independence 10 years ago, the last piece of the former Yugoslavia to do so. Serbia has continued to reject Kosovo's secession.

The assignment of a prefix goes hand in hand with the recognition of the sovereignty of a new state by the United Nations. Ninety-two UN member states recognize Kosovo as an independent state, including the United States, Britain, France, and 22 European countries. Because of Russia and China, nations with veto power in the Security Council of the United Nations, Kosovo can not currently be accepted among the countries of the UN.

The procedure for assigning a prefix for amateur radio goes hand in hand with the Civil Aviation Authority. The ITU works in tandem with the ICAO (International Civil Aviation Organization). By international agreement, aircraft tail numbers use the same prefix as radio call signs.

So, what is the status of Z6? The IARU (International Amateur Union) has still not recognized Kosovo as a separate nation because of its dispute with Serbia. However, it is yet to be determined if the ITU will recognize the Z6 call signs as legal, since Kosovo is not yet fully recognized as a sovereign state. It is recognized as a DXCC entity for DXCC credit. Meantime Kosovo joins a short list of DXCC entities where radio amateurs use "unofficial" call sign prefixes. The list also includes Western Sahara (S0) and the Sovereign Military Order of Malta (1A).

Reporting from the Dark Side, Ron, K5HM

POTA or Parks on the Air continues to be a strong drawing card for newbys and older hams. POTA, for those who don't know, was a radio activity following the VERY successful NPOTA (National Parks on the Air) event ARRL sponsored in 2016 to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the National Parks System. Individuals operated from National Parks and Monuments all over the United States and Territories. Jeff KC5TT and Yours Truly KD5FBA had a friendly competition during that year to work as many NPOTA qualified entities as we could with each of us amassing over 200 each. In 2017, along came POTA with the addition of State Parks, Monuments and Conservation Areas. Once again mostly individuals, groups of friends and spouses began viciting state parks and state properties in addition to the original

individuals, groups of friends and spouses began visiting state parks and state properties in addition to the original National Parks properties that are recognized by the POTA organization. All modes and bands are available, meaning all license classes may participate. Land-based repeaters are NOT eligible. Satellites are frequently used and encouraged.

Most operators who activate parks are individuals rather than clubs, however some groups of friends will activate parks out of the friendship that ham radio operators are famous for rotating in turn each giving their call signs so that each receive credit for contacts. Each operator will then submit their own log. I now have friends in several states that I first met as they activated while I hunted a park. At the present time, I have both activated and hunted parks. My totals are nowhere near the top as a hunter even though I presently have credit for over 2100 park entities all on voice modes.

POTA is a special interest group and growing. Remember that it is a facet of ham radio along with rag-chewing, contesting, antenna building, kit-building and others.

ARRL recently published a "New Book" on parks on the air and may be purchased from a number of sources. Check it out. — Scott Medbury, KD5FBA

The next BVARC test session will be **Saturday December 9**<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 AM. **Pre-registration is required.** For new licensees the testing fee, paid at the session is \$15. An additional \$35 license fee (totaling \$50) will be collected by the FCC separately for new, renewal and vanity calls. License upgrades **do not** pay the added \$35 fee, just the \$15 session fee.

#### YOUTH LICENSING INCENTIVE PROGRAM
